Enemy on the River Thames

If you ever visit London and you look out across the River Thames you will be surprised at the number of ships sailing up and down the river from many different countries. They are all welcome.

It has not always been so. At times there have been unwelcome visitors and none more so than those who sailed up the river in June 1667.

These were Dutch ships and they had come to strike a blow* at the English Navy. They broke through a chain on the River Medway, which gave protection to the English ships. Several were set on fire; others were blown up; while the great ship *Royal Charles* was stolen by the Dutch. Later another Dutch fleet* sailed up the river to Tilbury.

Samuel Pepys wrote in his diary, "It was a sad sight to see so many good ships sunk in the river when we thought that the English were the masters of the seas."

Why did it happen? Simply because the people had become careless and had taken too much for granted*. They learned their lessons. When the war broke out five years later, England was well prepared. The Dutch did not repeat their attack.
